This planning guide helps teachers and students prepare for the Festival and aids teachers in developing this theme further in the classroom.

The Festival features 46 activity stations based around five themes: water conservation, water protection, water attitude, water science and water technology.

All activities:

- Connect to the curriculum in ways that help students to achieve the desired expectations (Health & Physical Education, Mathematics, Science & Technology, Social Studies);
- Are designed to be hands-on and experiential in order to enhance and personalize the learning;
- Provide for holistic learning in an environment that demonstrates the integration of people, phenomena and ideas;
- Are geared to the interests, abilities, and special needs of learners; and,
- Reflect the beliefs that guide education accountability, quality, equity, partnerships, and a safe environment



Preparing for your Day

- Divide students into groups of 6 students. Ensure you have one adult supervisor per group.
- Make copies of the Site Map/Festival Scheduler one for each adult supervisor.



- Select activities that best suit your group's interests, as a guideline (not to be followed exactly). Descriptions of the activity stations with curriculum links are online at www.childrenswaterfestival.ca
- Have students pack litter-less, nut-free lunches, which they will carry with them throughout the day. Students should bring filled water bottles.
- Teachers and adult supervisors are responsible for notifying the Festival Coordinator and photographers if they have a student(s) who cannot be photographed. Please draw a raindrop on the name tag of all students that cannot be photographed.
- The Festival will be held rain or shine! Please come prepared with appropriate clothing, footwear and sunscreen if necessary.
- Ensure you review the bus confirmation and find out if your bus is leaving the school later than 9:10 am and /or leaving the Festival earlier than 1:30 pm

What to Bring on the Day of Your Visit

- Appropriate Clothing for the weather
- Lunch and a Water Bottle
- **Name Tags** for each student, teacher and adult supervisor (with rain drops drawn on those who cannot be photographed).
- A Class List
- Site Maps/Scheduler for each supervisor

On the Day of your Visit

- *Your bus will pick students up at 9:10 am (unless your school has a later pickup please see confirmation form)
- Upon arrival, a greeter will board your bus, outline information about the day and direct the bus to the drop off area
- Advise adult supervisors that they are responsible for the behaviour of their group during their visit. Students must be accompanied by an adult at all times.
- Lunch is from 11:30 am to 12:00 pm. All activities are closed during lunch. Please encourage students to eat their lunch during the scheduled lunch time and not earlier as stations will close during the lunch time.
- Volunteers are wearing green shirts, blue aprons or safety vest
- First Aid and Lost & Found are located in the Volunteer Tent
- At 1:20 pm the Festival ends and all activities close. Promptly meet at your school sign in the bus departure area. Volunteers will lead you to your bus when all the students from your school are together at your school sign. Please do not go to your bus on your own.
- *Some schools need to leave the Festival as early as 12:45 ensure your adult supervisors know what time to meet in the bus departure area

Cancellation Policies and Basic Safety Rules

- Please ensure children stay in their groups and are accompanied by an adult at all times (including washroom breaks and lunch).
- Teachers/adult supervisors are to be aware of any medical conditions and/or allergies within their group.
- First Aid is available in the Volunteer Tent (refer to site map, page 3). The entire group and the adult supervisor must go together to the station.
- In the event of a serious health or accident emergency, contact the nearest Festival volunteer who will ensure 911 is called. The on-site First Aider will be deployed immediately.
- If a child becomes separated from his or her group, he/she will be accompanied to the Volunteer Tent (refer to site map, page 3). A Safety Committee Member will ensure that the child is reunited with their group.
- Should a child go missing, please let a volunteer know immediately with the child's description. Our search procedures and safety protocol will then be set in motion.
- We request that participants do not bring two-way radios as they interfere with the Festival's communication lines.
- Pittock Reservoir is off limits.
- Pittock Conservation Area will be open to the public during the Festival. Please notify a volunteer if you notice any suspicious persons within the Festival area.
- In the event of sudden severe weather, the Festival Coordinator will blow an air horn 3 times and you will be directed to your bus (buses will be used as shelter during severe weather).
- Cancellation Policy if unsafe weather develops such that the Festival is cancelled before you arrive at the Festival, the Safety Committee will notify the bus company and each school before 8:30 am.
- No refunds will be issued for student absences or class cancellations after April 2. If the Festival is
 cancelled due to severe weather prior to arrival, efforts will be made to reschedule classes. If this
 isn't possible, refunds will be issued.

Making the Most of the Festival

Preparing Students for the Festival and Pre-lesson Plan Ideas

- Discuss the purpose of the field trip to the festival and how it will relate to the current unit(s) of study.
- Introduce potentially new vocabulary words that will be used at the festival (i.e. invasive species, aquatic, watershed, water cycle).
- As a class, brainstorm a set of standards of conduct for the trip and discuss the festival site, lunch plans, appropriate clothing to wear for the trip including gear for rainy weather.
- Discuss with students how to ask good questions and brainstorm a list of open-ended observation questions to gather information during their visit. Record questions on chart paper or in student field trip journals.
- Assign student groups "specialist" roles in one water theme (e.g. attitude, science, conservation, preservation and technology) that they will be learning about.
- Encourage students to share observations, make sketches and take notes about what they learned about their theme during the festival. The parent supervisors can help with this.

Debriefing after the Festival and Post Lesson Plan Ideas

- Provide time for students to share general observations and reactions to their field trip experience. Have student group "specialist" share specific observations or information they learned about their water theme while at the festival.
- Link field trip stations to multiple curricular areas. For example, students can develop vocabulary lists based on field trip observations; record field trip observations in a classroom journal; create a bulletin board about their experiences etc.
- Create a short news report about what happened on the field trip. Publicize the trip via an article in your local newspaper, school bulletin board, trip presentation for parent's night, or class web page.
- Have each student complete the "student evaluation" sheet attached. Encourage them to include favorite objects or special information learned during the field trip.
